What is CLiC?

CLiC (clic.bham.ac.uk) is a web application that was specifically designed for the analysis of literary texts. With the help of CLiC you can trace occurrences of words across a single text or compare the usage of a word across several novels. CLiC currently contains over 130 books, mainly from the 19th century. You can investigate words in their contexts and focus on different parts of the text (such as character speech or narration). For example, CLiC can be used to look for speech verbs, as shown in the screenshot from Hardy's *Tess of the d'Urbervilles*.
